



<u>Remembering an Angel</u>

My earliest memory of attending a Good Patrick's Shepherd Day Dinner St. was approximately 55 years ago at Knights of Columbus Hall. I was very young, and the event left me with one distinct memory which has taken me a lifetime to understand and appreciate. In the middle of the crowded room, where a lot of commotion was occurring, stood a man who seemed to have rockstar status as people were flocking to him. When my dad spoke to this man, I remember that he was wearing a white robe, which was different from what my dad was wearing, a suit and tie. As we walked away from this man, Dad told me that this person was a living angel. This man was Brother Mathias.

Being young, I did not appreciate what Dad meant with the "angel" comment. However, I still remember it after these past five decades. I most likely did not understand what an angel was at the time. I also probably thought that angels attend all social events. In other words, appreciating Dad's comment has taken me a lifetime of experiences.

I grew up being taught that each of us is responsible for making our community a better place. In this context, I now know that Dad meant to teach me that Brother Mathias is an example of a person dedicated to helping others. I was also taught to focus on a person's actions rather than on what a person says. With this understanding, I believe that Dad wanted to show me further that one person can bring the community together for an important cause. Although Dad and Brother Mathias have passed, I look forward to attending the upcoming St. Patrick's Day dinner because it allows me to continue a very special tradition.

Want to go to Dinner?

On the surface, it seems like a rather benign question. However, there was a time as a newly minted college graduate, I was asked a similar question. Except the question was, "Do you want to help prepare a dinner?" Again, seems relatively harmless. Little did I know this question would lead to a 37-year commitment that surpasses even my marriage to my wonderful wife! (More on that later).

Upon graduating and beginning a new career, many people are looking to give back, participate, or to volunteer for something. That is what led to the question. A very dear friend of mine, God rest his soul, invited me to "participate" in the preparation of a meal for St. Patrick's Day for the benefit of the Little Brothers of the Good Shepherd Homeless Shelter in Albuquerque, NM. I was introduced at the time to another group of committed individuals who, at the time, I didn't realize would become lifelong friends. I attended a meeting hosted by Robert "Bob" Johnson, was in charge of food preparation for the corned beef and cabbage dinner to be served on St. Patrick's Day—which at that time, had been served every St. Patrick's Day for the prior 38 years!

To be clear, the "preparation of the food" for the dinner takes on quite a number of tasks. Normally, at these dinners, around 1,000 meals are served. It used to involve picking up the food that was to be prepared (hundreds of pounds of corned beef, cabbage, carrots, and potatoes). Part of the food preparation involved peeling the potatoes which, when I first began, was all done by hand and was done on the patio of the GSC. Picture that patio filled with 40 or so volunteers, potato peelers in hand, attacking 500 pounds of potatoes for the dinner! To many of you, all of the above sounds like work. Ugh! But I can assure you, that to any of you who had volunteered and participated, you established friendships and gained a tremendous appreciation for serving your brothers and sisters in need! Now, for a variety of reasons, there is no need to have volunteers prepare the food as we have the meal catered. It's more cost effective to do it that way.

Dinner preparation is one thing. Location of the dinner is another. In the early days of the dinner, it was held on the State Fair Grounds. Some of the cooking was done there and, as I understand it, was not an ideal venue. When my involvement began, the dinner was held at the Convention Center. We held the dinner there for over 30 years, with the exception of one year when a national bowling tournament superseded our That year the dinner was moved to dinner. Hoffmantown Church and went off without a problem. The following year, it was back to the Convention Center. That relationship continued until we could no longer afford it, which seemed to be the end of the dinner. We then reached an agreement with St. Pius High School for the use of their facilities and where the dinner is currently held on or around St. Patrick's Day.

Many things about the dinner have changed over the years. From the locations of prepping the food, to the need for soliciting volunteers to assist in the various aspects, to the ability to have green beer at the Convention Center when the dinner was served, to the location of the dinner itself. The one thing that hasn't changed, however, is the ability to count on every St. Patrick's Day that there will be corned beef and cabbage dinner put on by volunteers to benefit the GSC. Comradery and family atmosphere will never change and the fun that is had and the memories made will last a lifetime. Just ask my wife. Here luck would have it that her birthday falls on March 16 and many of those March 16ths were spent with us doing something to prepare for that year's dinner. Not once did she complain and she too established lifelong friendships from what began as a simple question..."Want to go to dinner?"

Legacy across the World

Brother Mathias Barrett, Good Shepherd Center's founder, was born in 1900 in Ireland and became a Brother of the Hospitaller Order of St. John of God in 1916. The Order is known for its medical ministry to the poor and destitute around the world.

In 1950, during the time that the Order's focus expanded to caring for the homeless and destitute, Brother Mathias was tasked with continuing to expand the ministry to the United States. There he founded the congregation of The Little Brothers of the Good Shepherd. One year later he opened the Good Shepherd Refuge, what is today known as Good Shepherd Center.

While he would go on to found many other ministries and facilities in Ireland, the United Kingdom, and Canada, as well as more in the United States, much of his work was right here in Albuquerque serving the homeless and hungry. He strove to promote human dignity for those most in need.

Less than a year after opening its doors, Good Shepherd Center hosted its first Annual Corned Beef and Cabbage Dinner to celebrate both the founding of the Center and congregation, as well as to say "Happy Birthday" to Brother Mathias himself. Every year since then we have held the Dinner to remember our roots.

Today we provide not only meals and overnight shelter to those on the street, but also substance abuse treatment, respite, and assistance with housing for the homeless and unsteadily housed. In these ministries we carry on Brother Mathias' legacy. With your help we are able to provide these services to those in need. YOU are helping to continue his legacy. Thank you!
